Beloved Friends In Community,

I cannot believe that it is time once more to share with you the anticipation that is building as we look toward the sacred season of Advent and the uncontained Joy of Christmas. I pray that you have encountered the peace of Christ in these chaotic and uncertain days of our present moment. It is Good News that Christ still comes among us with quiet courage and everlasting hope.

As we enter this sacred Advent season and journey toward Christmas, I can't help but acknowledge what so many of us carry in our hearts: fear, uncertainty, and the weight of all we cannot control. Whether we fear for our families, our health, our community, or our world, Advent meets us precisely there. In our waiting, God is already at work. In our longing, Christ draws near. And in our fear, the Holy Spirit whispers again and again: *Do not be afraid.*

This year, our Advent worship invites us to a holy question: **“What do you fear?: Insisting on Hope this Advent.”**

We will explore together how the presence of Emmanuel—God with us—does not dismiss our fears, but transforms them, giving us courage for the journey ahead.

Luke's Gospel begins the story of Jesus with this opening line: “In the time of Herod...” Maybe this detail seems minor to us as modern readers; but it reveals layers of information about the fearful world Jesus entered, one filled with rampant oppression, economic disparity, uncertainty, and instability. A world not so unlike our own. And yet, throughout the stories of Christ's birth, we hear the whispers of angels delivering

a surprising message: “Do not fear.” When Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the magi are each called into God’s redemptive story, they do not deny their fears—they move through them. They ask questions, hold fast to courage, trust in good news, and say, “Here I am, Lord.”

When we find ourselves in fearful times, can we acknowledge our fears while also insisting on hope?

This Advent and Christmas we are seriously listening to the angels’ message trusting that Christ’s birth truly is good news of great joy for **all people**. We want to band together to look closely at the fear and terror that was looming in the background during the time of King Herod that it might invite us to consider the fears we hold now. Fear can divide and paralyze us and even be used as a tool for oppression. But what if we formed a different relationship with fear? Can we acknowledge fear without letting it rule us? Might we catalyze our fears into love and action? What if naming our fears helps us see more clearly how God is breaking in and where God is at work?

As a church family, we are renewed when we gather. When we lift our prayers side by side, hope takes root. When we sing, even if our voices tremble, courage rises among us. When we worship, we discover again that we do not walk this road alone.

So, we warmly invite you to make the rhythm of worship in community a meaningful part of your holiday season this year:

✨ **Sundays in Advent** – We believe that in community we find courage for the journey. Worship is a time to face our fears with faith and to kindle hope together. We hope to see you on November 30th, and December 7th, 14th, and 21st at:

We recognize the complexities of life and are glad to be able to offer a recording of weekly worship available on the Trinity Brackenridge United Methodist Church Facebook page shortly after the conclusion of the service. If for any reason you cannot worship physically, we hope this digital ministry of virtual connection is a blessing to you, and that you will reach out to let us know how we can serve you wherever you might find yourself.

✨ **Advent Spiritual Disciplines** – Opportunities to practice what we are learning and discerning what God is speaking will be available in a multitude of formats. We hope you “like” the Allegheny Valley Charge Facebook page for daily reflections and prompts from Advent through Epiphany. Physical and digital devotional booklets are available, as well as youth and adult advent calendars. You can feel free to reach out to me personally to ensure you have the resources you need to attend to the pregnant hope of the season.

A MISSION THAT KEEPS GROWING

Internationally known opera singer Marianne Cornetti has been active in the United Methodist Church from her roots at **Trinity UMC in Brackenridge** in the Butler District. In 2020, Cornetti, who now serves as the General Manager and Artistic Director for the Pittsburgh Festival Opera, was looking for a way to help others during the COVID pandemic. She learned that UPMC Western Psychiatric Hospital had 80 patients under the age of 18 who would be in the facility during the Christmas season, but there was no funding for Christmas gifts for them. Marianne took on this need by seeking partnerships with family, friends and colleagues willing to help in gifting this ministry. In 2020, she was able to raise \$5,000 to provide 80 Christmas gift bags to the children in the UPMC Western Psychiatric Hospital.

Marianne agreed to continue leading this initiative in 2021 and was able to raise enough funds for 300 Christmas gift bags. In 2022 she raised more than 400 Christmas gift bags. In 2023, she again raised 400 gift bags to the UPMC Western Psychiatric Hospital inpatients, and residential facilities in Pittsburgh, Erie, Somerset and Altoona.

As part of this funding effort, Marianne started a concert in 2022 named "Marianne Cornetti and Friends." The inaugural year of the concert had 250 persons in attendance at the Carnegie Music Hall in Oakland. The concert performers included not only Marianne and other nationally acclaimed vocalists and musicians but also musicians and vocalists from Western Psychiatric Hospital who performed and gave testimonies. In 2024, the concert had 500 persons in attendance. The date for the 2025 concert (was) June 8, 2025.

From its humble beginnings of raising \$5,000 for Christmas gifts for 80 children, this charity has now grown immensely and expanded its reach into many other areas.

Marianne's commitment and advocacy for persons with mental illness grew from her desire to provide Christmas gifts to children hospitalized at Western Psychiatric Hospital in 2020. "No one should ever have to worry about never being accepted because they have mental illness. They should be welcomed in this world and our community. This ministry is something that just dropped out of the sky on me. God simply handed it to me."

Here are a few simple options for **automatic recurring giving**:

- **Through Your Bank's "Bill Pay" Service** - Most banks offer a free "Bill Pay" option. You choose the amount and frequency, and your bank will automatically send a check to the Financial Secretary at Trinity UMC.
- **Online Giving** - Visit www.trinitybrack.org/give or simply scan the QR code below to set up one-time or recurring gifts securely online.



If automatic recurring payments aren't for you, there are still other simple ways to give:

- **During Sunday Worship** - You can always place your offering in the collection plates during our regular Sunday services.

Special Giving Opportunity for Seniors

If you are **70½ or older**, did you know you can make gifts directly from your IRA or 401(k) to Trinity UMC? This special option, called a **Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)**, allows you to give directly to the church while also enjoying valuable tax benefits.

- Your donation can count toward your **Required Minimum Distribution (RMD)**.
- Gifts made this way are **not included in taxable income**.
- Lowering your adjusted gross income may reduce the amount of your Social Security benefits that are taxed and help avoid high-income surcharges on Medicare premiums.

This giving method is a blessing both to the church and to you! Ask your IRA or 401(k) administrator for details and guidance.

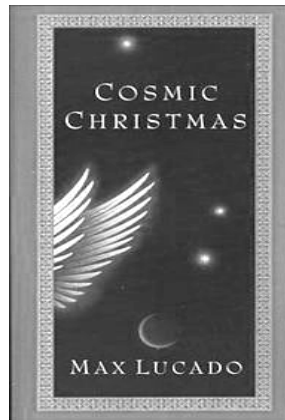

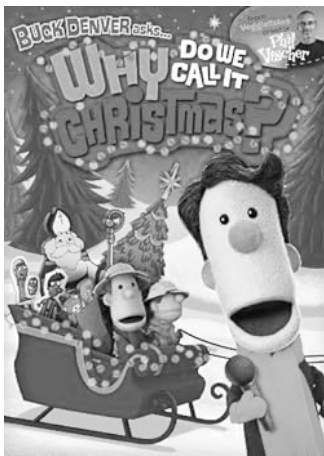

WHY DO WE CALL IT CHRISTMAS?

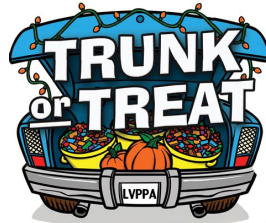

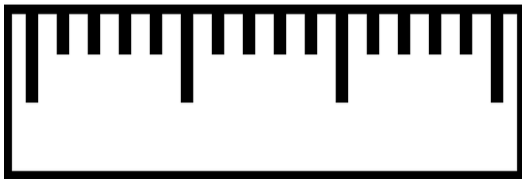

Casey has worked with Armstrong Community theater and Ford City High School conducting pit orchestras and teaching music to production casts. Casey also plays in groups such as Big Fat Jazz, Gibbons Big Band and Kiski Area Community Band.


Scott DiTullio (Trumpet) is currently the Director of Bands and Lecturer in the Department of Music and Theatre at Thiel College, where he directs the Marching Band, Concert Band, Wind Ensemble, and Jazz Band. He holds a B.S. in Education (Music Education/Performance) from Clarion University, a Master of Education in Curriculum and Instruction from Lock Haven University of Pennsylvania, and a K-12 Administration Certification for Principals through California University of Pennsylvania. He completed a Doctorate in Education (Ed.D.) with a concentration in Curriculum Leadership from Northeastern University in Boston. Dr. DiTullio, serves with the Pittsburgh Youth Philharmonic as Director of Bands and Director of the Intermezzo Band. In the summer of 2023, he was the featured soloist for the PYPO Ireland Tour. Scott performs regularly with the Butler Musicians Concert Band, the Good Times Big Band, The Harrisville Community Band, Nostalgia, the Pittsburgh Doo Wop Big Band, and The Clarion River Brass Quintet. Guest conducting performances include: the PMEA District 2 and 3 Jazz Band festivals, IU #9 Elementary Band Festival, Mercer County High School Band Festival, Clearfield County High School Band Festival, The Autumn Symphonic Winds, and The Nevada All-State Small Schools Concert Band (2024). He is a sought-after clinician presenting on Trumpet, Music Performance Portfolios, Building Success with Performance Ensembles, and Music Literacy and the Common Core.

Juli Paluch (French Horn) is a graduate of Indiana University of Pennsylvania, where she earned her BFA in Music. By day, she works as a graphic designer and production artist for Frank B. Fuhrer Wholesale and also does freelance design work for the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra. Juli has played French horn with Westmoreland Symphonic Winds for over ten years and performs regularly with Sinfonia at Seton Hill. She has also played in numerous high school, community theatre, and semi-professional pit orchestras all around Southwestern PA. In addition to performing, Juli sings in the choir and plays handbells at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church.
