We have some difficult news. We have never experienced a worldwide deadly pandemic as this. We do not like it. Some would like to pretend it is not here, or we do not have to worry. It is a worry that the facts do not seem to matter. One may wonder if we care about what is happening to our fellow Americans, much less the people around the world.

The facts are and truth is (as of January 17, 2021)

The coronavirus is currently raging at a higher rate than any time previously.

As of Monday, January 18, the Federal Covid Task Force announced a recommendation for Pennsylvania to again ban indoor dining at bars and restaurants at least as long as January 25.

There are new strains of the virus that spread nearly twice as fast as the strain that started this crisis. There are people in and related to our families that are testing positive, and hospitalized with Covid-19.

Allegheny Valley Hospital has nearly one half of all patients treated, with the coronavirus.

In some places persons are dying at the rate of 1 adult every 6 minutes.

As a ministry of Jesus Christ, our highest values include:

Providing love, comfort and care, safety, teaching of good values, and helping all to become good examples of faith and faithful living to all people, especially the community we serve, the Allegheny Valley. These values drive our decisions regarding ministry, activity, fellowship and witness.

WHEN Will We Resume “Live, In-Person Worship at Trinity?”

The good news is we care about our church. We miss each other, and the fellowship we enjoy in worship with each other.

We plan to return to live, in-person weekly worship in the sanctuary when we have a reasonable expectation that we can do so safely, reassure people of their safety, and enable people to worship, fellowship, and enjoy the company of each other without concern.

This is what it means for us to truly love one another as we love ourselves and family.

HOW Will We Return to Worship at Trinity?

We will continue to offer weekly pre-recorded online E-Worship Services
(9:00 AM Sundays on Website and Facebook.)

Live, In-person Worship will resume in the church sanctuary when we re-open.

There will be one, live service (of combined worship styles), 9:30 am Sunday Mornings

We will continue to maintain social distance, wearing masks, and follow CDC and Board of Health Guidelines (until all have received vaccine and/or virus spread is no longer a danger)

We will expect everyone to observe social distance, wear masks, give temp, and register.

Ministry Today Requires Technology

Failing this we will see the church continue to diminish and move ever more toward closing.

Tech Training at Trinity

The time has come for us to equip the ministries of light, sound, and video with people in the church. Ministries not passed on, tend to disappear. Ministries apprenticed tend to be perpetuated. Tis the Season of Reducing Racism

Below is an article of Do's and Don'ts for us to consider and help all persons to feel and be respected and equal (regardless of race). This article comes to us from Ms. M.Garlinda Burton, acting Secretary of the Commission on Religion and Race, of The United Methodist Church, and the WPA Conference E-News. Combating Racism is one of the 5 Areas of Focus for our Conference.

Do:

- **Connect the dots.** Preach, teach and say clearly in your church, “What is happening is rooted in systemic, historical, institutional racism. This is not just politics; it is racial violence, and racism is a sin against God.”
- **Name the racism you see.** Those who attacked the U.S. Capitol Building and protested election results in other state capitals wore Nazi and Ku Klux Klan insignia; they waved nooses and the Confederate battle flag, all of which are long-revered symbols of white supremacy and racist violence. Learn that history.
- **Participate in a study or discussion.** Learn what you don't know about racism. Listen to people of color when they speak from their personal experience of racism.
- **Develop a thicker skin.** Racism is a fact. Confronting and naming it requires you to learn its history and acknowledge its continuing presence in your church and community. Adjust to saying and hearing the word “racist.” Instead of feeling defensive and guilty, choose to become an ally for change.
- **Counter with acts of equity and justice.** Contact your representatives, encouraging them to support and enact laws that counter historic and current expressions of racism. Send a financial gift to a church or local organization actively working against racism in your community.
- **Look for systemic racism.** Peaceful demonstrations led by Black activists have been met with barricades, windows and doors of the Capitol Building were able to do so without much resistance from law enforcement. This is an example of systemic racism in our policing practices and proportionality of response.

Don't:

- **Confuse “not racist” with antiracist.** Anti-racism means one is actively confronting and seeking to dismantle racism in one's faith and daily life. Accepting the status quo and pretending race isn't a “thing” does not help to end racism. All Christians should embrace anti-racism as part of our walk with God.
- **Miss an opportunity to teach.** Racism has such a hold on our society because white people are taught to ignore or dismiss it, and to believe “race” is something “they” have. Pastors and teachers in white congregations equip Christians to become anti-racist by naming historic, systemic and even theological racism and seeking ways people of faith can confront and interrupt it.
- **Say, ‘I don't see color.’** Read the Pentecost story in Acts 2. All people of all nations, races and tribes celebrated the coming of God's Holy Spirit. God made us all colors and intended we celebrate this diversity. The goal of anti-racism is for all of us to celebrate and “see color” as a gift from God, without ascribing greater or lesser value to God's people based on their skin color.

Don't:

- **Fail to use your white privilege for good.** Speak out when you see racism happening. Champion changes in your church, workplace and civic groups that allow wider inclusion of BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, people of color) folks. White people tend to respect and listen to other white people with greater openness and seriousness. Use that to foster anti-racism.
- **‘Over-talk’ People of Color.** Even in the work against racism, some white people are so used to being “experts” in the group they may unconsciously overtalk or dismiss the ideas and experiences of people of color. Anti-racism work requires white people listen to and take the lead from people of color.

Once and Future Church

Can you remember a time when church mattered? Do you remember covered dish dinners, church picnics, vacation bible school, full nurseries, Sunday School for all ages, youth groups, weddings and funerals in church, talent shows, plays, educational events, holiday dinners, church outings?

Can you remember volunteering, welcoming new friends, receiving new members, spending more than an hour, more than once a week at church, and enjoying it? Can you remember being excited about Jesus Christ, faith, ministry, and the Kingdom of God?

Can you remember when people were kinder and more civil to one another, when folks were not so selfish, so ready to argue, so quick to complain? Can you recall seeing new things, discovering new talents, exploring potential, being given new opportunities, enjoying respect, and all ages caring for each other? Do you remember good and happy times at church?

Can you remember when church was appreciated, respected, and popular in the community? Some may not have noticed the reduction of such things over the last few decades. Some may not remember the joy of faith and fellowship in all aspects of activity and service. Some may not realize how much they have changed over the years. Some will not have noticed or known how or when things changed, so much lost. Some will say "The world is different now." Some will say, "It is someone else's turn." Some will say, "People do not care anymore." Some might think all that matters is taking care of ourselves until we pass or have to close our doors.

If we can remember the good, how good it has been, then we can consider how good it can be!

And do not say there are no people available or young people. Hundreds attend at least three churches within a few miles of our building. Recent statistics indicate approximately 70% of people in any community in America, do not attend church, many of whom have never been inside a church. There are plenty of people who could benefit from church life, just as active and happy as we remember it. And would we not enjoy seeing our church thrive again? Would we not like to see people treat each other better, get along a little more? Would we not like to see less suffering, poverty, divorce, conflict and crime? Is it not Christ who helps to make that happen? It is not we, who know and love Jesus, the ones who represent the best and happiest way that life can be?

If it is impossible the end is what will be, yet even then, in the eyes of God, I'd rather we go out loving, serving, helping, restoring, enjoying and saving, than in grief and surrender. And You? What would you like to see us be and do?

Zoom Combined Meetings

In the past several months ZOOM meetings have multiplied for churches, businesses and families all across the country. We have held several ZOOM meetings ourselves. The problem for us has been, not everyone is online and so do not have access. We have a solution!

Twice now we have been able to set up a connection at the church. Those who are not online have come to the church. We have used a big screen TV and external camera and Bluetooth speaker/microphone, to enable the group at the church, to connect in ZOOM meetings with individuals in their homes or other remote locations.

Special Offerings Resume

We are deeply grateful for all the financial support we receive from many in our congregation. Our focus upon the General Fund has truly kept our church open. Your faithfulness has helped us continue to function for this whole season of Covid-19. While the coronavirus continues to rage, we do not know when limitations and restrictions will end, but we are planning to resume and expand our ministries as best we can, and as quickly as possible.

Toward that end we are resuming the reminders of opportunities to support Church Special Offerings. Throughout the year there are many opportunities for donors to direct gifts (beyond the tithes and offerings to support the church).

We do not ask everyone to give to everything. Rather, we offer a variety of projects and ministries to which we hope you may have a special interest, and to which you give extra support. One such opportunity is our quarterly support for Emergency Relief for individuals and families. The first Sunday of every quarter we receive this special offering to support AVAC. (A percentage of each of these offerings is placed in the Good Samaritan Fund, with our intent to build over time to help us respond in care to our community in the event of a disaster.)

Reminders will be posted on Website and Facebook Pages, and included in the online worship announcements.

How to Submit and Label Your Offering Envelope

Currently, people are being asked to contribute first to the General Fund because that is the fund from which the church pays its operating expenses (i.e. utilities, pastor's salary and benefits, staff salaries, praise team salaries, building repair and maintenance, taxes, apportionment [percentage sent to UMC], and office supplies.)

Even so, people are free to make designated gifts and those monies will be placed in the designated funds, or distributed as they request, with proper credit applied to their records. We ask people to prioritize the General Fund, and to consider Designated Gifts as over and above their regular offerings. All gifts people give to specific purposes will go to those purposes.

If you are making a contribution "in memory of" someone or if you are making a contribution to a particular fund - such as Good Samaritan or Green Day or the like - please write that on your envelope.
